State of the Region Update



The South Mountain Partnership is kicking off the new year with some exciting "resolutions"! While we already have great intentions to continue regular events, offer three grant programs, and see you out in the community, we also have some exciting new actions from the State of the Region! Our first SOTR project, the Natural Heritage Inventory, is underway thanks to the work of the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy who reported their research of critical plants and animal species has resulted in 62 surveys with more field work to occur this season!

We know our community needs more access to trails! Creating multi-use trails is often a long process, and a key first step would be the creation of a regional coalition to support and advocate for more trails. The coalition can also be the driver of planning for a cross-county trails that are multi-use pedestrian and non-motorized trails and for other trail development recommendations. This project will accelerate us becoming a region with a robust multi-use pedestrian and non-motorized trail infrastructure that connects communities with one another and open space.

Grants

- **PA DCNR Community Conservation Partnerships Program**: The annual Community Conservation Partnerships Program grant application window is now open. The DCNR oversees the grant program, which funds local recreation and conservation projects in communities across Pennsylvania. Last year, the program awarded more than \$79 million to more than 300 projects statewide. Grant applications are only accepted through the DCNR Grants Customer Service Portal. A <u>portal tutorial video</u> is available to help applicants learn about grant requirements and how to navigate the application. Even though the grant round just opened, it's never too early to contact your <u>regional advisor</u> for assistance. Regional advisors are available for site visits, questions, and project-specific advice (it is recommended to contact them early for assistance.) Applications are due by 4:00 PM, Wednesday, April 2. **Learn more here.**
- **Keystone Historical Conservation Grant program**: The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission is accepting applications for their Keystone Historical Conservation Grant program. This program supports initiatives that bring history and historic preservation into communities or historic sites programming. To

celebrate the 250th anniversary of the Second Continental Congress' adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 2026, applicants are encouraged to consider projects that further the initiatives of this upcoming celebration during this grant round. Applications are due Monday, March 3. **Learn more** <u>here</u>.

- **Partnership for Better Health Grants:** The Partnership for Better Health is accepting grant applications due March 3, 2025. Grants fund work related to health equity and social determinants of health. Funding opportunities include General Operating Grants for Organizations Leading in Equity Work, Project Grants to Address Root Issues, and Spark Grants. Learn more here.
- **Mid-Atlantic Environmental Justice Fund:** The Chesapeake Bay Trust is seeking applications for its grant program that leverages forestry to address environmental justice issues in the Mid-Atlantic. The goal is to disperse and democratize the range of co-benefits that healthy community forests have for decades into the future. Applications are due March 14. Learn more here.


